Berties Pet Shop was opened in 1997 and was taken over in 2017 by Peter Mortimer who is very well known to all of his customers and their humans.

This little gem of a shop caters for most pets and specialises in natural raw dog food and natural treats for dogs. Pete is very accommodating and if he does not stock what you need, he will source any requirements.

Berties has a great local customer base and their customers really do become their friends. The shop can resemble a community centre at times, with many people popping in, not just to stock up on supplies for their beloved animals, but sometimes just for a chat. 

# 3. 52 College Street The White Hart

At one time there were ten public houses in Higham Ferrers. Directories used to be published detailing the various amenities in a town, and the details were often gained from postmen who regularly walked around the area.



The information was then collated and published. Nine public houses were listed for Higham Ferrers but there also used to be one called The Red Cow at the junction of Kimbolton Road and Station Road.

In 1841 James Sargeant was the publican at The White Hart. The pub was listed continuously until 1861, and then again in 1876. Abraham Brown was the last person recorded as having a licence but he died in 1871, so the recording of the pub's existence in 1876 would suggest human error. Women were not officially allowed to be licensees of pubs at this point, although some

records do suggest that they did have a major part in the running of such enterprises, often as the chief brewer. In White's directory of 1896, Mrs Eliza Sargent is listed as the publican of The White Horse. The old White Hart has been a private property for many years. The present owner, who is the fifth generation of the same family to own the property, has done much to restore both the exterior and



interior. The original fireplace has been opened up and the beam exposed.

The house has a long heritage. On the 1591 map of Higham Ferrers, it is possible that the footprint of the home today was present in the 16<sup>th</sup> century. If so this, together with The Old House and Church House, would make it one of the oldest buildings in the town to have been continuously inhabited.

# The Bedesmen of Higham Ferrers Celebrate Bedesday



Thanks must also go to the many businesses and individuals of Higham Ferrers whose generous donations ensure the continuance of this 600 year old tradition.

The Bedesman have held a Bedesday celebration every December for the 600 years since they were founded. They would have originally all lived together at the Bede House, and 6 centuries on the Bedesmen are proud to still hold this tradition in the same wonderful historic building.



### HIGHAM FERRERS TOURISM'S FOOD FOR THOUGHT AIDS THE NEEDY

BUSINESS AND COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP

Higham Ferrers Tourism (Tourism) are always thinking of projects for the benefit of the town and the local community. And they have been plotting one

for months that will help those in need over Christmas and beyond. They have been earmarking proceeds from various events throughout the year for the Higham Ferrers Food Bank, run by the local charity Encompass. Members have also been rattling the collection bucket at some of their functions to boost their year-end donation to the food bank.

Now they have just donated a much-needed £500 to Encompass, which will convert it into grocery and household essentials – and some extra Christmas cheer – for local families facing financial hardship. "This donation will definitely help people over Christmas and into the new year," said Jo Burns, chief executive of Encompass, when members of Tourism visited the Higham Ferrers Working Mens' Club where food parcels are sorted out ready for distribution every Tuesday morning.

They also met volunteers - Mayor Nigel Brown, Mayoress Jackie Brown and Councillor Jennie Bone – described as the "backbone" of the organisation by the chief executive. The Mayor pointed out that Encompass was particularly grateful to the Working Mens' Club for making a room available to them free of charge as without it, they could not operate.

Liz Barnatt, chair of Tourism, said that the charity did such "wonderful and worthwhile" work for the community that there was no debate among members about which organisation should receive the end-ofyear donation.

Encompass provides food parcels to a total of 600 households in Higham Ferrers, Rushden, Raunds and Thrapston, with 94 families in Higham Ferrers benefitting from the charity. "Families receive food parcels six times a year, but if they are in real dire straits, we can increase it to eight times," Jo explained.

The charity relies on donations from companies as well as organisations and individuals and donations had dropped during the year. "Households and businesses are facing hard times and cannot give as much. At one stage, donations dropped to almost nothing and

as a result, we had to cut down on some of the items in food parcels," Jo said. "However, donations are slowly increasing again, largely due to Harvest Festivals and the festive season," she added.

Kind-hearted local people remember the charity at Christmas and just as we were leaving the photoshoot, a local woman arrived at the club with £100 cheque from her elderly neighbour.

Encompass has food collection points across the county in local supermarkets and doctors' surgeries and Jo said the charity was particularly grateful for the regular donations from the Higham Ferrers Co-op which donates fresh food which it has left over at the end of the day.

As well as helping people in poverty, Encompass also caters for those in addiction and homelessness.

They connect people to community groups and statutory services for practical and emotional support across Northamptonshire.

SPRING is a free, confidential service and the eligibility criteria must be met to be accepted into the program.

- Live in Northamptonshire
- Be over 18 years of age
- Diagnosed with at least One long-term physical health condition
- Be willing to commit to the program and engage in positive lifestyle changes.

### **Looking forward to Spring!**

Spring bulbs have been planted in their thousands both in the churchyard, public gardens and spaces around the town.



We were fortunate to have been donated 5000 purple crocuses by the Rushden Rotary Club. These have not only been added to the wonderful drift along Church Walk and other areas of the churchyard but also in the little Castle Field, the cottage border at Chichele College, the Duchy Barn Garden and the town's troughs and fountains supplied by Higham Ferrers Tourism.

Donations of purple crocus by the Rotary Club began in 2016 to raise awareness of their mission to eradicate polio from the world. A purple crocus was chosen to represent the colour of the dye marking the finger of a child that has been immunised. Over many years we have received several thousand corms to ensure a colourful display in early spring and we look forward to the rewards of their planting across the town.

The Friends of St Mary's continue with planting daffodils along Station Road thanks to a donation by Higham Ferrers Tourism. Daffodils, alliums and tulips have also been added to the churchyard, so we are looking forward to an especially cheerful spring display.



Each year we visit Spalding Auction House to buy bulbs to sell at our Autumn Coffee Morning to cover the cost of planting. We add any unsold bulbs to the churchyard and plant miniature daffodils in pots for sale at the Spring Coffee Morning.



## **Bee Squared Project 2024**

After the success of the 'Bee Squared Project' in 2023, Higham Ferrers Town Council allocated funds to replicate the project in 2024.

Higham Ferrers Junior School, Henry Chichele Primary School, Higham Ferrers Nursery and Infant School and The Ferrers School are eager to be involved in the project to specifically help solitary bees survive by encouraging all pupils to add a



square metre of bee loving plants to their gardens in the ground or in pots.

Each pupil will receive a packet of seeds which contains a seed mixture of Corncockle, Cornflower, Corn Chamomile, Corn Marigold, and Common Poppy and instructions on how to sow the seeds in late March/early April.

Because of the demand for the seed packets in 2023 from the residents of Higham Ferrers, we have produced packets for the general public which will be freely available at a number of the Town's shops and at the Higham Ferrers Town Council Office after the seed packets have been distributed to the schools in late March.

### **Information about Bees:**

In the UK alone, there are 267 species of bee. Over 90% of them are not social and do not live in colonies - these are solitary bees. Solitary bees vary considerably in size, appearance, and where they choose to nest. Roughly 70% are called mining bees and nest in underground burrows. Bees that nest in houses are called cavity-nesting bees. Solitary bees



do not live in colonies, produce honey, or have a queen. While honey bees use wax to construct the cells inside their nest, different species of solitary bees use all sorts of materials to make their homes - for example, leaf-cutter bees use tiny leaf pieces within their nests, which might be in a hollow plant stem, dead wood or a crack in a weathered wall. They don't have pollen baskets for carrying pollen, meaning that each time they visit a flower they lose far more pollen than social bees. This makes them much better pollinators: a single red mason bee is equivalent to 120 worker honey bees in the pollination services it provides. ### The Walnut Tree - The Circle of Life

You will all be familiar with the walnut tree that was located on the triangular open space at the junction of Kings Meadow Lane and Station Road. The Walnut tree has a dedicated blue plaque and is also point 15 in the town's Heritage Trail. From the trail the accompanying text states:- The Walnut tree is reported to be 500 years old and as far back as Henry VII's reign as the 'Ancient Tree'. H E Bates' grandfather George William Lucas lived in one of the cottages close by.

Surrounding the walnut tree are 3 younger walnut trees, that were cultivated from the tree, and planted some years ago with the intention of being replacement trees for the main walnut tree. Like any tree, the walnut tree has a lifespan. Walnut trees can be long-lived (100 to 300 years) and can thrive in the right conditions for centuries. The walnut tree in Higham Ferrers has thrived for centuries but unfortunately it reached the end of its life and was felled on the 21<sup>st</sup> December.



In June of this year an independent tree survey noted the tree had extensive basal decay and fire damage. Contractors carried out work to remove ivy which was becoming more dominant and was preventing full inspection. Removal of the ivy revealed the area of degradation to be extensive. The tree was deemed unstable and presented as a risk to the public accessing the area. The open space area was therefore barriered to prevent public access.

Given the significance of the tree within the town the advice to fell the tree was initially challenged. Instruction was given for detailed inspection with sonic tomography. The test confirmed the severely decayed stem with further degradation inevitable and in subsequent years the disconnect of the stem from the ground.

The Council considered the options for the tree.

Propping the tree was possible. Given the condition of the base of the tree, whilst propping would stop it failing, it would not stop further degradation. Propping the tree came at a cost in the region of £10,000 for initial installation, with adjustment cost to the framework in subsequent years.

Cutting back the tree to a standing monolith is possible, but again, this will not stabilise the tree, nor stop further degradation and its ultimate failure.

With this knowledge the council reached the difficult decision to fell the tree.

During the felling, sections of trunk that were not presenting severe decay were left at the site to create dead wood habitat. The council is also assessing the condition of felled sections and the scope for creating a small wood carving as a legacy in the community. Cuttings have been taken from the tree and residents are reminded that previous cuttings that grew to form the 3 younger walnut trees are present on the triangle and will continue to be nurtured as they grow and flourish for future generations.
