
In this edition of the Higham Times we are looking at another of the wonderful High Street businesses.





5. Chichele CollegeCollege Street

Henry Chichele was born in Higham Ferrers in about 1362. His father was a substantial landowner in Higham and had been



Mayor of Higham in 1380 and 1381. Following his election to become Archbishop of Canterbury in 1414, Henry had the opportunity and resources to set up three institutions in Higham, the grammar school supporting the young, the Bede House supporting the old, and Chichele College.

In 1422 Henry Chichele petitioned the Pope, (Martin V) and the King (Henry V) for permission to build the college. He held a public meeting for the mayor and the free tenants of the Borough asking if they approved of his proposal. A loud cheer went up as those present unanimously agreed with the idea.

Henry Chichele funded the college through the rents of his various properties in Essex, London and Higham, including revenue from the swan.

The term 'college' was used at the time to describe a community of priests who shared a communal life that was less strictly controlled than that within a monastery. The college survived in its original purpose for just over 100 years. In 1543 the building was taken into the King's hands with the dissolution of the monasteries. The repossessed sites were then offered for sale and Robert Dacres bought the College and



it remained in his family until 1734. It has since been used as a farm building and as a public house.

The college was first listed as a scheduled monument in October 1981. It is now in the care of English Heritage but managed by Higham Ferrers Tourism and Business Partnership on a day-to-day basis.

Chichele College today

Chichele College and the adjoining Duchy Barn Garden are an important community asset for the town. A wide range of art, cultural, heritage and community events are held from Easter to Christmas Sparkle and the gardens are open for free all year round for visitors to enjoy.

As an English Heritage Free to Enter site, it provides a welcome retreat for the Spring Social Prescription group of men who meet weekly throughout the year and is a welcome summer venue for the Gateway Club, a charity for adults with a learning difficulty. A team of enthusiastic volunteer gardeners work throughout the year and the large recreational area is used for playing croquet during the summer.

Many events have already been held this year: Chichele Garden Fair; three art exhibitions, (including one by local school children); a live jazz night; the Great Big Green week involving schools and the Gateway Club.

MEDIEVAL MUSINGS, MONKS, MUSIC AND A SPECIAL MENU

Higham Ferrers' schoolchildren have just had a special history lesson and some of them even sampled a recipe from a bygone era. They had been invited along to the town's medieval Chichele College and the neighbouring Duchy Barn Garden by Higham Ferrers Tourism to celebrate The Great Big Green Week.

"We organised creative activities for them in keeping with the medieval origins of Chichele College when the college was a monastery and was home to monks who grew herbs and plants for cooking. The herbs and plants were also used to cure people of sickness," said Carol Fitzgerald, a Tourism Committee member and chairperson of the sub-committee, the Chichele College Management Committee.

More than 100 children from Higham Ferrers Junior School and the Henry Chichele Primary School visited Chichele College over two days and the pupils from the Higham Ferrers Junior School also got the chance to sample pottage, made from vegetables grown at the time the college was a monastery. Made by two guest chefs, the pottage was flavoured with medieval herbs that are still grown in the college garden. "It was a different type of taste and although not everyone enjoyed it, most did," Carol said.

Pupils also got creative and made medieval-style pendants with the help of members of HiFars, the Higham Ferrers Archaeology and Research Society. And they helped to make music with percussion instruments as they accompanied the visiting folk group, *2 Steps 4 Words*. Then, to encourage biodiversity, the local "Hedgehog Mother", Jackie Bestwick told them how to encourage hedgehogs into their gardens and how to make hedgehog nests.

And not to be left out of The Great Big Green Week, members of The Gateway Club which caters for adults with learning difficulties and who meet up at Chichele College and the Duchy Barn Garden, had a special painting session. Their paintings of bees, butterflies and flowers are now on display at Chichele College, alongside the artwork of local schoolchildren who recently entered Higham Ferrers Tourism's children's art competition.

SETTING THE BENCHMARK

DOWNTIME AT THE DUCHY GET STUCK IN

It did not take long for the men in Higham Ferrers's new social group to get going on their special project.

Set against a backdrop of the town's medieval Chichele College — founded by locally-born Henry Chichele who became the Archbishop of Canterbury — and the neighbouring historic Duchy Barn Garden, the team got cracking constructing an all-in-one circular picnic table and bench. After a cup of tea and a bit of banter in the College, the *Downtime at the Duchy* group

headed outside to the Duchy Barn Garden to tackle their project.

All have long-term health conditions but had never met before joining the group. They have been brought together by *Spring*, a social prescribing and well-being service and community-driven support network which helps people manage their various conditions. *Spring* is run by the Northamptonshire Carers Association.

When the Association was looking for a green space so that it could run a gardening group, Carol Fitzgerald, chair of the Chichele Management Committee – a sub-committee of Higham Ferrers Tourism – offered the College facilities, having received the blessing of English Heritage. *Downtime at the Duchy* members meet every Thursday to chat, play cards and dominoes and support each other. But as they have also been planning to turn their hands to gardening during warmer weather, they needed somewhere suitable to sit now and then whenever they needed to take a breather.

Higham Ferrers Tourism stepped in and turned to their friends at the town's Co-op, who promptly presented Liz Barnatt, Chair of the Tourism committee and Carol Fitzgerald, with £150 for the picnic table and bench, with *Spring Social Prescribing* co-funding the project.

One of *Downtime at the Duchy* members, Trevor Strutton, had previously made two benches for visiting children to the venue, complete with carved artwork and the *Downtime at the Duchy* men appointed him chief carpenter for the picnic table task. And a few hours later, after the team got stuck in, the picnic table and bench had been assembled. Then, there were smiles all round as they tried it out for the first time.



The job completed, it was time for the Downtime at the Duchy men to try out their handiwork.

"It was great to witness their camaraderie as they worked on the project," Carol said.




D-Day 80th Anniversary Beacon Lighting




The Mayor and councillors were joined at the beacon lighting by many residents, the CCF (Combined Cadet Force) and representatives from the Armed Forces.
